

Macron names EU's Brexit negotiator Barnier as France PM

PARIS: President Emmanuel Macron named the EU's Brexit negotiator, Michel Barnier, as France's new prime minister on Thursday after more than 50 days of caretaker government. The appointment of the 73-year-old Barnier follows weeks of intense efforts by Macron and his aides to find a candidate who might be able to build loose groupings of backers in parliament and survive possible attempts by Macron's opponents to quickly topple the new government that Barnier will now put together and lead. Super Typhoon Yagi: Chinese cities shut schools, cancel flights

HONG KONG: Cities in southern China suspended schools and cancelled some flights on Thursday as Super Typhoon Yagi headed towards the holiday island province of Hainan after strengthening from a tropical storm. Yagi triggered floods and landslides on the main Philippine island of Luzon this week, killing 13 people, according to official figures. It intensified into a super typhoon as it tracked west across the South China Sea, China's Xinhua news agency said, carrying winds of up to 209 km per hour as it headed for Hainan. "Hainan upgraded its emergency response to Yagi to the highest level at 11.30 am on Thursday, according to the provincial disaster management authority," Xinhua said. AFP

AI CONVENTION TO ENSURE NEW TECH DOESN'T ERODE OLD VALUES US, Britain, EU to sign first international AI treaty

he first legally binding international AI treaty will be open for signing on Thursday by the countries that negotiated it, including European Union members, the United States and Britain, the Council of Europe human rights organisation said.

The AI Convention, which has been in the works for years and was adopted in May after discussions between 57 countries, addresses the risks AI may pose, while promoting responsible innovation.

"This Convention is a major step to ensuring that these new technologies can be harnessed without eroding our oldest values, like human rights and the rule of law," Britain's justice minister, Shabana Mahmood, said in a statement.


The AI Convention mainly focuses on the protection of human rights of people affected by AI systems and is separate from the EU AI Act, which entered into force last month.

The EU's AI Act entails comprehensive regulations on the development, deployment, and use of AI systems within the EU internal market.

The Council of Europe, founded in 1949, is an international organisation distinct from the EU with a mandate to safeguard human rights; 47 countries are members, including all the 27 EU member states.

An ad hoc committee in 2019 started examining the feasibility of an AI framework convention and a Committee on Artificial Intelligence was formed in 2022 which drafted and negotiated the text.

The signatories can choose to adopt or maintain legislative, admin-

istrative or other measures to give effect to the provisions.

Francesca Fanucci, a legal expert at ECNL (European Center for Notfor-Profit Law Stichting) who contributed to the treaty's drafting process alongside other civil society groups, told Reuters the agreement had been "watered down" into a

broad set of principles. "The formulation of principles and obligations in this convention is so overbroad and fraught with caveats that it raises serious questions about their legal certainty and effective

enforceability," she said. Fanucci highlighted exemptions on AI systems used for national security purposes, and limited scrutiny of private companies versus the public sector, as flaws.

"This double standard is disappointing," she added.

The UK government said it would work with regulators, the devolved administrations, and local authorities to ensure it can appropriately implement its new requirements.

RUSHDIE'S MEMOIR AMONG 12 BOOKS UP FOR A TOP NONFICTION PRIZE

LONDON : Salman Rushdie's account of a stabbing attack that blinded him in one eye is among contenders announced Thursday for a prestigious nonfiction book prize.

Rushdie's memoir Knife: Meditations After an Attempted Murder is among 12 books on the long list for the £50,000 Baillie Gifford Prize.

The 77-year-old novelist recounts being attacked at the Chautauqua Institution in western New York in 2022 as he was about to deliver a lecture on keeping writers safe from harm. A New Jersey man, Hadi Matar, is awaiting trial for the stabbing. Prize judges called the book brutally clear, honest and, best of all, funny.

Rushdie won the Booker Prize for fiction in 1981 for Midnight's Children. He spent years in hiding after Iran's Ayatollah Khomeini issued a fatwa, or edict, in 1989 calling for his death for the alleged blasphemy in his novel The Satanic Verses.

Other semi-finalists for the nonfiction prize include Australia's Richard Flanagan for his memoir Ouestion 7 and several works on Asian history, including Gary J. Bass' Judgement at Tokyo: World War II on Trial and the Making of Modern Asia and Viet Thanh Nguyen's A Man of Two Faces: A Memoir, A History, A Memorial.

Founded in 1999, the Baillie Gifford Prize recognizes English-language books from any country in current affairs, history, politics, science, sport, travel, biography, autobiography and the arts

It has been credited with bringing an eclectic slate of fact-based books to a wider audience.

Finalists for the 2024 prize will be announced Oct. 10 and the winner will be crowned Nov. 19 at a ceremony in London

LONDON: Larry, the Downing Street cat, is facing a challenge to his position as the British government's chief mouser from a cute "Russian" kitten.

New Prime Minister Keir Starmer and his family, who moved into Number 10 after the Labour leader's win in July, brought their family cat JoJo with them.

Now after "negotiations" with the Starmer children -- who had wanted a German Shepherd dog -- it has been agreed that Jojo will also be joined by a "Siberian kitten".

"There's been a long summer of negotiations, back and forth, different options," Starmer told BBC radio in an interview broadcast on Monday.





A NEW RESEARCH SHOWS IT REALLY DOES AFFECT THEIR SLEEP

It's almost impossible to keep teens off their phones in bed

A research has found that using screens in bed was worse for sleep than using screens for hours before going to bed. Sleep guidelines recommend no screen use in the hour or two before bed. But experts found screen time in the two hours before bed had little impact on young people's sleep. Instead, it was screen time once in bed that caused problems.

DUNEDIN: Parents of children and teenagers have long been warned about the dangers of screen time and digital devices before bed — the worry being that screens could harm the sleep patterns of young people.

But do screens really hurt the length and quality of sleep? Our new research found that using screens in bed was worse for sleep than using screens for hours before going to bed.

Sleep guidelines recommend no screen use in the hour or two before bed. But we found screen time in the two hours before bed had little impact on young people's sleep. Instead, it was screen time once in bed that caused problems.

Using cameras to track device usage and sleep, we found using a device in bed could cause more harm than screen time right up to bedtime.

These findings challenge long-held assumptions about screen time at night and could help parents improve the quality of their children's sleep.

Connecting sleep and screens A number of global organisations recommend adolescents stop using devices in the hour or two before bed, and instead undertake activities like read-

But these recommendations are based on research with a number of limitations.

The studies were designed in such a way that researchers could link sleep and screens. But they don't tell us if changes in how young people used screens had an affect on the length or quality of sleep.

Most of the existing research also used questionnaires to assess both screen time and sleep. Questionnaires are unlikely to capture true screen time accurately, particularly if you are interested in knowing more than just how long an adolescent has spent on their device.

To address some of these weaknesses in the previous research, we asked 85 adolescents aged between 11 and 14 to wear a body camera on their chest for the three hours before bed, for four nights.

These cameras faced outwards and accurately captured when, what and how adolescents used their screens. Because we were interested in overnight screen time as well, a second infrared camera was placed on a tripod in the teenagers bedroom and captured their screen time while in bed. The research participants also wore an actigraph – a watch-sized device that objectively measured screen time.

Teen nighttime activity

It quickly became obvious the adolescents spent a lot of their screen time while in bed.

Our analysis looked at two time periods - from the two hours before they got into bed, and from once they were in bed (clearly under the covers) until they put their devices down and were clearly trying to go to sleep.

Our data showed 99% of the adolescents used screens in the two hours before bed, more than half once they were in bed, and a third even after first trying to go to sleep for the night. Just one teenager did not use screens before bed on any of the four nights.

The screen time before they got into bed had little impact on their sleep that night. However, screen time once in bed did impair their sleep. It stopped them from going to sleep for about half an hour, and reduced the amount of sleep they got that night.

This was particularly true for more interactive screen activities like gaming and multitasking - when they use more than one device at the same time (like watching a movie on Netflix on a laptop while playing Xbox on a gaming device).

In fact, every additional ten minutes of this type of screen time reduced the amount of sleep they got that night by almost the same amount - nine minutes

Revisiting guidelines

Our research was an observational study looking at the established screen habits of young people. The next step to better understanding this will be to conduct experi-

ments that can actually prove different types and timings of screen time affect sleep. That said, what we have already found challenges existing guidelines. Screens at night may not be the bogey man they have been made out to be. But allowing young people to have screens in bed can be detrimental to their quality of sleep.

So the simple message might be to keep those devices out of the bedroom.

France pilots school mobile phone ban

PARIS: Tens of thousands of pupils in France are going through a slightly different return to school this autumn, deprived of their mobile phones. At 180 "colleges", the middle schools French children attend between the ages of 11 and 15, a scheme is being trialled to ban the use of mobile phones during the entire school day.

The trial of the "pause numerique" ("digital pause"), which encompasses more than 50,000 pupils, is being implemented ahead of a possible plan to enforce it nationwide from 2025.

Right now, pupils in French middle schools must turn off their phones. The experiment takes things further, requiring children to hand in their phones on arrival.

It is part of a move by President Emmanuel Macron for children to spend less time in front of screens, which the government fears is arresting their development.

The use of "a mobile phone or any other electronic communications terminal equipment" has been banned in nurseries, elementary schools and middle schools in France since 2018.

In high schools, which French children attend between the ages of 15 and 18, internal regulations may prohibit the use of a cell phone by pupils in "all or part of the premises." Bruno Bobkiewicz, general secretary of SNPDEN-Unsa, France's top union of school principals, said the 2018 law had been enforced "pretty well overall".

Improving 'school climate'

The experiment comes after Macron said in January he wanted to "regulate the use of screens among young children." According to a report submitted to Macron, children under 11 should not be allowed to use phones, while access to social networks should be limited for pupils under 15.

With an increasing amount of research showing the risks of excessive screen time for children, the concern has become a Europe-wide issue.

Sweden's Public Health Agency said this week children under the age of two should be kept away from digital media and television completely

and it should be limited for more senior ages.

One of Britain's biggest mobile network operators, EE, has warned parents they should not give smartphones to children under the age of 11.

The French education ministry hopes that the cellphone-free environment would improve "school climate" and reduce online harassment and dissemination of violent images.

The ministry also wants to improve student performance because the use of telephones harms "the ability to concentrate" and "the acquisition of knowledge". The experiment also aims to "raise pupils' awareness of the rational use of digital tools".

'Complicated to implement'

According to the education ministry, "it is up to each establishment to determine practical arrangements", with the possibility of setting up a locker system. Pupils will have to hand in their phones on arrival, putting them in boxes or lockers. They will collect them at the end of classes. The ban also extends to extracurricular activities and school trips.

But the enforcement of the measure across all schools in France from January 2025 could be expensive.

According to local authorities. the measure could cost "nearly 130 million euros" for the 6,980 middle schools in France.

If a phone goes missing from a locker, this would also cause an added financial problem.

Education Minister Nicole Belloubet said on Tuesday that the ban would be "put in place gradually".

Messi missing from Ballon d'Or nominees

PARIS: Lionel Messi will not win another Ballon d'Or this year after being left out of the nominees revealed by organisers on Wednesday, as stars of Spain's Euro 2024-winning team and Real Madrid's Champions League victors feature heavily.

Messi claimed the eighth Ballon d'Or of his glittering career last year. Now aged 37, he is not among the 30 contenders this time despite winning another title with Argentina at the Copa America in July.

The former Barcelona supestar, now playing club football in MLS for Inter Miami, was also missing from the nominees in 2022 when Karim Benzema took the honours.

However, he returned to win last year after leading Argentina to glory at the World Cup in Qatar.

The most prestigious individual award in football is voted for by a jury of journalists from each of the top 100 countries in FIFA's world ranking.

Brazil forward Vinicius Junior is among the favourites and is one of six members of the Madrid team that won La Liga and the Champions League last season to be nominated. Jude Bellingham, Dani Carvajal,

Toni Kroos, Antonio Ruediger and Fede Valverde are the others, while Kylian Mbappe - who left Paris Saint-Germain for Real over the close season – features too.

Carvajal is among the contenders from the victorious Spain team alongside Alejandro Grimaldo, Dani Olmo, Rodri, Nico Williams and Lamine Yamal.

Manchester City's Norwegian star Erling Haaland and England and Bayern Munich striker Harry Kane are on the list as well, but there is no place for five-time winner Cristiano Ronaldo, now 39.

Xabi Alonso, who won the Bundesliga in an unbeaten season with Bayer Leverkusen, is among the favourites for best coach.

His rivals include Real Madrid's Carlo Ancelotti and Spain's Luis de la Fuente

PARALYMPICS Dharambir shatters Asian record to clinch gold in Paris

PARIS: Dharambir shattered the Asian record to win the gold medal while compatriot Pranav Soorma clinched the silver as Indian club throwers dominated the men's F51 event at the Paralympics here.

After four fouled attempts, the 35-year-old world championships bronze medallist from Sonepat, Dharambir, hurled the club to a distance of 34.92m in his fifth attempt to claim the top spot on the podium on Wednesday.

Soorma, who injured his spinal chord at 16 when a cement sheet fell on his head, then produced a throw of 34.59m in his first attempt but the 29-year-old from Faridabad couldn't better and get past Dharambir as India completed a one-two.

The third Indian in the fray, 2017 world championship silver medallist, trailblazing Indian para-athlete and Dharmbir's mentor, Amit Kumar Saroha, however, finished last with a best effort of 23.96m.

Serbia's Filip Graovac bagged the bronze, courtesy a 34.18m throw in his second attempt.

The F51 club throw event is for athletes who have movement affected to a high degree in the trunk, legs and hands. All the competitors compete while seated and rely on their shoulders and arm to generate power.

From paralysis to Paralympic glory

Dharambir faced a life-altering accident when a misjudged dive into a canal left him paralysed from the waist down. Para-sports gave him a new direction in life when he was introduced to it by fellow para-athlete Amit Kumar Saroha.

Within two years, Dharambir qualified for the 2016 Rio Paralympics, marking the beginning of a successful career. He has since earned multiple medals for India, including a silver at the 2022 Asian Para Games.

A cricket and roller hockey enthusiast, Soorma too was just another teenager when a cement sheet fell on his head when he was 16, leaving him paralysed after causing a severe spinal cord injury.

Top seed Sinner defeated 2021 US Open champion and two-time runner-up Daniil Medvedev 6-2, 1-6, 6-1, 6-4

He will take on 25th-ranked Jack Draper for a place in the final after the British player made his first semi-final at the Slams with a 6-3, 7-5, 6-2 win over Australia's Alex de Minaur

Sinner, 23, is the only top-10 man to make the semi-finals with No.12 Taylor Fritz due to face US compatriot Frances Tiafoe, ranked 20, in Friday's other last-four duel.

Sixth-ranked Pegula booked a place in the last-four of a Grand Slam for the first time by sweeping past Swiatek 6-2, 6-4

On Thursday, she will tackle Karolina Muchova who saw off Beatriz Haddad Maia of Brazil 6-1, 6-4.

Emma Navarro of the US tackles world number two and Australian Open champion Aryna Sabalenka in the other women's semi-final.

"It was very tough, I knew it would be very physical," said Sinner, who had also beaten Medvedev to capture the Australian Open.

He has made the semi-finals without dropping a set as he continued an impressive summer run which saw him capture his first ATP title in Stuttgart and then defeat Carlos Alcaraz at Queen's Club. Draper sent down 11 aces among his 40 winners while forcing De Minaur to fend off 14 of 20 break points. The British player enjoys a 1-0 lead over Sinner in the pair's head-to-head record although that win at Queen's came three years ago.



MUSHROOM PULAO

INGREDIENTS

1/2 bunch coriander, 1/2 bunch mint, 3 chilies, 1 inch ginger, 3 cloves garlic, 7 pods cardamom, 1/2 tsp pepper, 2 tbsp ghee, 1 tsp cumin, 1 bay leaf, 1 javitri, 1/2 tsp cloves, 1 pod black cardamom, 1 onion, sliced, 20 mushrooms, chopped, 1 tsp salt, 1 tomato, chopped, ½ tsp turmeric, ½ tsp garam masala, 2 cup water, 1 cup basmati rice, soaked 20 minutes

METHOD

Make a smooth paste of coriander, mint, chili, ginger, garlic, 4 pods of cardamom, and pepper in a mixer after adding a little bit of water.

Heat a pressure cooker, add ghee and saute cumin, bay leaf, 3 pods cardamom, javitri, cloves and 1 pod black cardamom.

Sauté the spices on low flame and then add onion and sauté till the onion changes



colour. Now add 20 mushrooms, 1 tsp salt and sauté them till the mushrooms turn aromatic

In the cooker, add the prepared masala paste and cook till oil separates. Now add tomato, turmeric, garam masala and cook for 2-3 minutes.

Pour in 2 cups of water and bring to a boil. To this, add basmati rice. Mix gently. Pressure cook the dish on medium flame for 2 whistles



INGREDIENTS

5 cups corn, 2 tbsp butter, 2 garlic cloves, minced, 1/2 tsp each salt and pepper, 1/4 cup mayonnaise,


